

Career Preparedness

During the last month there was a strong focus at Project DRIVE on "Career Preparedness." The students learned about interviewing skills during Career Skills Day which built off of last month's lesson in filling out job applications. For Career Day, Officer Michael Barritt came to Project DRIVE with K-9 officer Barry to teach the students about their career and responsibilities.

Open House

first semester and were thrilled to display their work for staff and parents.

Bread Lab

In science, the students are currently participating in a bread lab to emphasize the importance of washing their hands. Students prepared five specimens of white bread, each of which was handled

differently (no contact, hands on, after hand sanitizer, after washing hands and wiped across a computer keyboard). The results will be available after February break and the students will engage in conversation about their current hygiene habits and the implications.





Bridges

The Bridges organization came for their monthly group with the high school students. This month the focus was on self-care and being good to ourselves. Bridges will continue to meet monthly with the high school students to focus on relevant topics that are important to the students. The weekly Restorative Justice circles are continuing to strengthen and the students are becoming more invested in their community and learning to work together. In that vein, students participate in a monthly service project. This month the students prepared another community meal for SHARE, using their culinary skills to prepare the vegetables for the dinner.

LSCI

For the February professional development day, the Project DRIVE staff finished their final day of Life Space Crisis Intervention (LSCI) training which began at the end of the last school year. LSCI is a research based training and certification program that teaches professionals how to turn crisis situations into learning opportunities for at-risk students with chronic patterns of self-defeating behaviors.

What's Next

March has continued Career Skills activities, a Career Day, and Post-Secondary tour. There will also be continued Restorative Justice Circles, another lesson from Bridges, and they will be creating vision boards that will include their hopes, dreams, positive self-affirmations, and goal setting. - *H. Laquerre*



Experimenting with Hydroponics in the Innovation Lab

There are great things happening in the Innovation Lab. We received a hydroponic AeroLab, last month, through a grant. Braden Sullivan was instrumental in putting it together and planting our first crop. He loves to garden with his family and is very knowledgeable about gardening. We are learning how hydroponics differs from traditional gardening. We are experimenting with lighting, fertilization and watering. We are comparing germination rates of the different plants. We started with romaine lettuce, sweet bell peppers and green beans. Today we added cherry tomatoes, basil and chives. We are testing what plants will grow best in our lab. The best part is we get to everyone the fruits of our labor.

Last fall, we purchased a grow lab to experiment with hydroponics. It has been an eye opening experience. We started romaine lettuce, sweet bell peppers and green beans. They were amazing! We yielded five gallon-sized bags of lettuce. We have since moved on to various types of lettuce, cherry tomatoes, basil, dill, and chives. Our tomatoes and peppers have grown so large; we've had to put them in pots using a growing medium. This brought us to the next level of hydroponics. We are now experimenting with lighting, nutrients and a small pump system for water. We just harvested out first tomatoes and peppers and enjoyed a healthy Caprese salad. Our plan is to continue with the tomatoes and peppers and venturing in strawberries and herbs. We have purchased a few strawberry crowns and also planted a few seeds. We want to compare which will grow better. Our goal is to create a strawberry tower.

The hydroponic lab is going extremely well and we are having so much fun, we want to expand. We have been given permission to move into the old school store at the middle school. Since we are so new

to gardening and hydroponics, I called in a specialist from the University of New Hampshire Cooperative Extension, *Jonathan Ebba*, to help us design the area and plan materials for the expansion. Once we have the plan, then we will need to find funds. The students are very excited! Braden Sullivan checks in on the plants every day. Kyleigh Jones, Jaden Jodoin and Hunter Jones join us a few times a week. It will take hard work and require us to raise money. We will be looking for sponsors and volunteers to help us in our new hydroponic nursery. We will keep you up to date with the new nursery and our strawberries. We have our own "Grow It Green" team. *- Pam Moreau, Innovation Lab*

 \star You can recognize how someone feels by looking at the person and noticing their body signals.


- How are they breathing?

Milford Educators Focus on Social-Emotional/Behavioral Challenges

The February PD day allowed MMS educators to trial and participate in team-building, problem solving, and communication type activities that could be integrated into their Responsive Advisory student groups. Some staff members led activities with their colleagues, and facilitated discussions about how each activity could be used with students. Educators concluded that the activities would provide students with important skills that build confidence, develop communication and problem-solving skills, strengthen interpersonal skills, and promote teamwork. The PD day continued as educators viewed portions of the documentary "Who Cares About Kelsey?", and considered individual needs of students. Through an activity called *The Power of Being Seen*, staff gathered in grade-level teaching teams and discussed ways to support students who exhibit social-emotional/ behavioral challenges.

English Language Learners Participate in ACCESS Assessment

For English learners and their teachers, February and March means spending some time devoted to the **ACCESS assessment**. This online assessment measures the progress of English learners in mastering academic English. It is an involved test; it has distinct sessions devoted to listening, reading, speaking, and writing, and it covers academic content like science and math.

This assessment does two important things. First, the assessment helps to answer important questions such as how students are progressing, are students getting the right kind of support, in which areas are students currently strongest, and where is extra attention needed? Second, the ACCESS results are a measure of accountability for the state of NH, and ensures that Milford School District is strongly supporting our English learners, as required by the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).

The ACCESS test has high standards for student success. It is not enough for a student to "know English" in the sense of chatting with friends or reading a familiar comic, as these skills alone will not make them ready for college or a job, nor fulfill Milford's own Portrait of a Graduate. Rather, students need to master the challenging academic genres and vocabulary necessary for success in higher education and professional careers. This is the standard of the ACCESS assessment and the goal of our English learners program in Milford.

KEEPING YOU INFORMED

Ensuring a safe, supportive, and positive school climate reflects our school district's core values and is essential to high quality learning for every student. On all our school campuses, we continue to be vigilant in cleaning common areas such as bathrooms, water faucets, classrooms, playground equipment, and cafeteria to minimize the spread of germs. We provide our staff and students with regular reminders about staying home when sick and following sound hygiene and health practices as listed below. As a reminder to our families, if your child is sick, please keep them home from school.

- ✓ Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- ✓ Avoid touching eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed bands.
- ✓ Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- \checkmark Stay home when sick.
- ✓ Cover a cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- ✓ Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.
- ✓ Individuals with chronic health issues and/or individuals experiencing severe symptoms should be evaluated by a medical professional.
- ✓ Get vaccinated every year.

Video Production students embarked on their first editing project - which incorporates Adobe's Premiere Pro software - as well as their first "Live Broadcast" experience. Advanced students jumped right into the "deep-end" with a team project that tested their ability to light and film a movie scene based on a specific genre. **Biotechnology students** were challenged to show off their micropipetting skills by creating a rainbow using just red, blue, and yellow dyes. Next they will be investigating gene expression using restriction enzymes to test for variations in DNA samples.

Business students are getting hands on experience organizing and operating their chosen business and will problem solve and make various decisions about the company along the way.

Accounting students are analyzing transactions in a double entry accounting system (debits and credits) and learning how daily transactions affect the accounting equation and the value of their business.



Congratulations to **Graphic Arts students Brianna Leo** (*Honorable Mention*) and **Stephen Podd** (*Silver Key*) for winning the Scholastic Art Awards of NH in the animation and comic arts categories!!!

Marketing I students are working on a food truck project where they will apply all basic marketing concepts to the opening of a food truck. Marketing 2 students will be using their product development and research skills in a "Shark Tank" style presentation at the end of the semester. Marketing 3 students are working on identifying underserved populations in the community and developing a community service project to benefit the identified groups. We are very excited to watch these projects take shape throughout the semester.

The month of February was *Human Computer Interaction month* for **Computer Studies students**, who were introduced to the importance of data collection for various purposes and explored different ways our data can be used, both for good and for harm. Additionally, they created YouTube videos to explain educational social media websites.

Precision Machining and Welding students are getting ready to perform single point threading on the lathe and learning to stick weld in the flat.

Construction Technology students are completing their shed buildings and are currently learning how to do milling trim molding work on a window.

Advanced Pre-Engineering students are actively working with Mrs. Hagamen's English 12 Honors students to develop kinetic poetry while Engineering Design students are learning solid modeling and Robotics is building its first VEX robots.


